We welcome innovation, creativity, and collaboration to upend the harmful systems that have marginalized communities of color for far too long.





# EVICTION PREVENTION

At Urban Strategies, Inc (USI) we understand that housing instability is a harsh reality that reflects centuries of inequities, disparities, and racism. We also know that housing instability can have a lasting impact on health, education, job security, and more.

According to the Eviction Lab, a nationwide eviction data website, most poor renting families spend at least half of their income on housing, with one in four families spending more than 70 percent of their income on just rent and utilities. Pair that with a lack of affordable housing options in most communities and one can see that many low-income families are one emergency or job loss away from eviction.

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit, many in the communities served by USI lost their jobs, were unable to work, or were forced to stay home with young children whose schools and daycare facilities were closed or unsafe. Their housing was at risk.

This crisis was not limited to residents living in communities where USI already has programs. It was crucial for us to put a process into place to get all individuals and families in need the resources they would need to stay housed.

# **USI Eviction Prevention Program**

Acting quickly, USI and McCormack Baron Management instituted the Eviction Prevention Hotline to serve people across the U.S. For months, regional teams provided daily guidance, resources, and connections to federal emergency rental assistance support. The Hotline proved to be an effective way to support individuals, especially after the Supreme Court ruled to do away with the federal eviction moratorium in August 2021, as laws and resources available varied significantly across the country.

"In the very short-term, we're trying to solve rent relief and ensure every resident has the information to make the best decision for their family," said Donovan Duncan, Executive Vice President at Urban Strategies, Inc. "This is at the core of who we are as practitioners to help families thrive. This allows us to create space for integration. We see folks who are struggling and see our support solutions as a conduit to create a better condition."

Today, according to the <u>Center on</u> <u>Budget and Policy Priorities</u>, almost 10 million are at least one month behind on rent, and half of them still believe eviction proceedings are likely even with millions of dollars of COVID-19 relief funds still not spent - and still large disparities in who is receiving help.

The work continues to ensure that all families are stable and thriving and that people in need are connected to systems of support.

# **ACCESS TO VACCINES**

# MIAMI, FLORIDA





As the COVID-19 pandemic continues to send waves throughout the country, the push for vaccinations has never been stronger, especially in communities of color. However, the mistrust of Americans with the science, and equity of vaccination resources has left many communities continually struggling with vaccination rates. At USI, we have many dedicated partners across the country who elevate and carry out our mission to lift residents up and provide education and access to opportunities. From schools and employers to fellow nonprofits and government institutions, we're grateful to partner in support of residents and families across the country.

One strategy we continue to focus on is offering vaccinations and support of the ancillary impacts the pandemic has on our communities, a lot of that work is centered around healthcare referrals, vaccinations, and access to equitable mental health supports.

For the past 10 years, USI has partnered with Aetna and CVS Pharmacy in Miami to support residents in the NorthPark at Scott Carver community. If we had a health event for residents, Aetna/ CVS would be there providing resources, information, and referrals to build stronger relationships between medical professionals and the greater community.

Rachel Walker, USI Director of Operations, reached out to partners to help residents obtain the COVID-19 vaccination. CVS was more than willing to help vaccinate residents in their pharmacies across town. However, Rachel noticed one problem: none of the CVS pharmacies were located within walking distance of the community.

In order to address equitable access to healthcare, including vaccinations, Rachel urged CVS to look into other options to ensure the 83.6% of NorthPark residents in partnership with USI were connected to services and treatments. Thanks to her advocacy and the dedication of a committed partner, CVS was able to provide vaccinations in mobile pop-up clinics for local Black and Hispanic communities.

We're proud of Rachel for speaking up and so grateful to our partners to continue to make strides toward long-term impact for historically marginalized communities.




# SAN JUAN, PUERTO RICO

For the residents of Puerto Rico, the COVID-19 pandemic became a huge stressor for the entire island and its economic mobility. As the Urban Strategies Inc. (USI) team began establishing our offices within the communities of Bayshore Villas and Renaissance Square in August 2019, many residents were already dealing with the loss of employment, an unstable government, and school closures. In January 2020, a 6.4 earthquake destroyed the Southwest part of the island, further aggravating the infrastructure of schools, employment, and housing for residents. In March of that same year, COVID-19 cases started to rise. As a result, the Puerto Rico governor implemented a complete lockdown of the entire island affecting primary sources of income for Puertorricans such as tourism, education, food distribution, and health services.

USI Puerto Rico quickly started engaging with households at each community to ensure they were stable and had everything they needed to provide for their families during these uncertain times. For example, USI staff partnered with local service providers like churches, neighborhood community leaders, local supermarkets, and health-related entities to provide hot meals for the elderly; distributing boxes of fresh fruits, vegetables, and proteins; sharing vaccination information and hosting vaccination clinics at the sites; mental health referrals, support through rent relief, and even employment opportunities at a brand-new supermarket recently established in one of the sites.

As a result of this collaborative work, USI Puerto Rico has seen growth in the numbers of partnering families, strategic partnerships, and vaccination rates. USI staff are laser-focused and are committed to continually addressing our communities needs and actively looking for partners that can support the island. The dedication and lessons taught through the USI Puerto Rico team on engagement, strategic focus, and partnering through crisis is essential for ensuring all children and families are stable and thriving.


# KINDERGARTEN READINESS

How Front-End Strategies Strengthen Back-End Results

Many factors can influence child development for children ages 0-5, such as biology, unstable housing, parental stress, and adverse childhood experiences. Studies tell us that as many as 1 in 4 children, ages 0-5, are at moderate or high risk for developmental, behavioral, or social delays. These conditions are linked to later behavior problems and poor academic achievement.

Based on the results of USI's Annual Youth Questionnaire (AYQ), on average about 15% of parents say that their children need interventions and disability supports. In ongoing conversations with parents they regularly express the need for assistance with ensuring that their child's development (e.g., language, movement, thinking, behavior, and emotions) are developing on track. That is why USI coordinates resources to provide early identification of delays as well as linkages to referrals and follow up intervention, when needed.

Striving to ensure our early learners are kindergarten ready, USI partners with parents and collaborates with childcare, Head Start, and primary health care partners to provide free screenings for early learners. Doing so helps to reduce the prevalence of developmental and behavior disorders that are linked to long term consequences for health, mental health, education, child welfare and justice systems.

# **CULTIVATING REFUGE**

# PITTSBURGH, PENNSYLVANIA

As anyone who has ever dug into the dirt to cultivate life knows... gardening has so many mental health benefits. What began as a measure to improve food security for residents at the Northside community of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, has grown to become a mental health refuge for the community.

The summer of 2021 brought bountiful crops in the 12 garden beds that were built, tended, and harvested by residents. Growing herbs, vegetables, and flowers, the gardeners have shared garden responsibilities as well as the beautiful, simple pleasure of experiencing the outdoors together. The results were the strong bonds of friendship, cooking demos to learn new ways to prepare vegetables, and the ability to produce food boxes for elderly residents in need.

The garden provided a safe space for healing, growing, and learning together as a community. Even the little ones helped with tilling, planting—and, of course, tasting. Many residents said that working in the garden helped ease the effects of their depression.

"The link between gardening and mental health is not new, but this community garden was an excellent opportunity to witness it," said Zoia Parvez, USI Project Manager in Pittsburgh. "The ability to care for something, grow and then reap in the form of harvest has allowed our resident gardeners to experience positivity and mental clarity that has been obvious over time."

This past season was just a taste of what could be—and we can't wait to see how it grows!

# **CULTURALLY RESPONSIVE HEALTHCARE**

# NORFOLK, VIRGINIA

Located in a Medically Underserved Area (MUA) and USDA-defined food desert, Peoples Pharmacy serves several health disparate populations, including the residents of Tidewater Gardens. This was a targeted strategy to specifically drive numbers of participants higher. Through the partnership with People FirstUSI residents with chronic health conditions have access to ongoing services to ensure the proper management of these conditions.

At the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, Peoples Pharmacy ensured equitable support to residents of Tidewater Gardens with chronic health conditions through chronic care management, personalized health and nutrition assessments, medication access and adherence, and transition of care services. Peoples Pharmacy also provided equitable access to COVID-19 vaccines and testing for the residents of Tidewater Gardens.


The most concerning risks of COVID-19 were amid individuals of color managing chronic health conditions since infection among these individuals would likely be fatal. A total of 35 residents with chronic health conditions received ongoing services through Peoples Pharmacy during this trying year. This partnership allowed us the opportunity to move the percent of individuals effectively managing their chronic health condition from 48% in Year One to 88% in Year Two.

Peoples Pharmacy also worked with Tidewater Gardens residents to establish current medical homes—or a place to receive primary care—a key component to stabilizing health and reducing the need for emergency services. This supported residents during their transition process and provided continuity of healthcare services post-transition.

"The best outcome of this partnership is the opportunity for residents in a medically underserved community to receive comprehensive health care that promotes healthy lifestyles, good physical and mental health, and tools and coping mechanisms to alleviate and better manage stress."

# FORT MYERS, FLORIDA










Like so many of the communities served by USI, the Edison Avenue–Dunbar neighborhood in Fort Myers, Florida has experienced the lasting negative effects of systematic racism and disinvestment.

The distressed Southward Village community was at the center of a historic corridor with wonderful urban community features, but also in a location lacking basic pillars of a thriving community, like a grocery store. Currently, nearly a quarter of Greater Dungar households live on less than \$15,000 per year, compared to the 5 percent of Fort Myers households, according to Choice Neighborhood Initiative.

USI is already hard at work to provide connections to services and other community events. A big initiative in Fort Myers will be ensuring that adults and children are mentally and physically healthy. We'll know we are successful in this area when we have a number and percentage of individuals who have a place to go for regular healthcare services and those who have health insurance. In our needs assessment, we discovered that more than 48% of the community did not have health insurance.



# Key partners in health:





USI continues to determine the most immediate and crucial needs to ensure that residents at Southward Village are stable and can thrive. These include supports in education, jobs, housing, and healthcare.

We were proud to host a successful community event in 2021, welcoming residents to explore connections to local employers, healthcare providers, and more.

Urban Strategies, Inc., (USI) is pleased to announce the expansion of its Choice Neighborhoods Initiative (CNI) Community of Practice.

Supporting racial equity and housing revitalization in more than 100 participating cities across the country, the USI Community of Practice empowers CNI grantees to influence positive change through a racial equity lens.

As a thought leader and influencer, USI has gathered a forum of local leaders, residents, and community stakeholders, such as city governments and public housing authorities, who are creating and implementing plans to revitalize housing in their communities.

This community with a knowledge base of best practices and processes for revitalization will provide:

- Data-driven strategies to improve outcomes for low-wealth families and communities of color
- Peer learning exchanges in the CNI peer network
- Evidence-to-action labs
- Direct support
- Opportunities to collaborate, discuss common challenges, create shared priorities



# A HEALTHY USI

# INTERNAL POLICY SHIFT







Many organizations and their employees continued to feel the stress and strains on systems amid the COVID-19 pandemic, which is still persistent today. Employers have been forced to reconcile with the harsh realities its employees continue to face - ranging from caring for a sick loved one, navigating inconsistent virtual and hybrid school schedules for their children, or perhaps experiencing mental health extremes.

For USI, these tensions exist for all employees, but they are also paired with the emotionally intensive work that we do. Our work drives systematic change for communities of color. It's a great mission and employees are likely here because of it. However, it can be a heavy burden to bear.

According to the Nonprofit Quarterly Magazine, more than 30% of nonprofit employees are burned out and another 20% are in danger of burnout. In order to make sure our

employees know we would never sacrifice their health or well-being, we made very intentional changes to our own internal policies.

- Paid sick leave and expanded family and medical leave both increased
- "Mental health days" do not need to be taken from accrued personal time
- COVID-19 policy plan was updated to keep employees safe
- A new Wellness Program for employees was created, featuring:
  - Meditation and breathing exercises
  - Fitness challenges
  - Education and resources
  - Encouraging remote work days when possible
  - Connections to experts on vaccination

"When a USI employee has had a lot of stress in the community— from hurricanes and earthquakes to violence and racism—we immediately provide employee assistance and services. When those terrible things happen, we can lift up our staff and make sure they feel supported."


# HEALTH @ USI RETREAT


In addition to updated policies and a new wellness programs, USI extended its outreach to employees to get another pulse check on wellness and spend a day dedicated to self-reflection and care.


This virtual wellness retreat allowed employees to focus entirely on their own mental and physical well-being, in a strategic effort to build safety, mastery, and connection within the organization.


